KNIFE

BLADE SHAPES

CLIP

- short, pronounced curve
- effective for detail work



MODIFIED CLIP

- popular with high-tech, one-hand openers
- shapes vary



DROP POINT

- gentle, sloping convex curve
- thicker blade point for heavier tasks



COPING

- narrow blade with sharp, angular point
- designed for cutting in tight spots or curved patterns



PEN

- smaller version of spear point blade
- typically found on pocket knives
- handy, all purpose blade



SPEY

- slightly blunt point avoids poking through surface
- well suited for sweeping strokes



SHEEPSFOOT

- named after the shape of the point
- makes a nice, clean cut on a flat surface



KNIFE MATERIALS

BLADE MATERIALS



S30V

- S30V steel contains carbon, chromium, molybdenum and vanadium
- best edge retention and tensile strength



420HC

- 420HC is a high carbon version of stainless steel
- excellent tensile strength and wear resistance

HANDLE MATERIALS

NYLON



- Glass-Reinforced Nylon
- impact resistant
- superior strength
- stability at extreme temperatures

WOOD



- Natural and Laminated
- unusual grains like Cocobola and Obechee
- treated with resin to protect natural beauty

ALUMINUM



- High-Tech Aircraft Grade Aluminum
- creates low-weight durable handle
- can be anodized for artwork

KNIFE TYPES

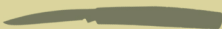
FIXED-BLADE

Fixed blade knives are a solid piece of steel anchored to the handle without any folding mechanism. Fixed blades are ideal for tough jobs.



FOLDING KNIFE

Folding knives benefit from the convenience of the blade folding into the handle. There are several configurations to choose from.



POCKET KNIFE

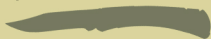
A classic design that is still very popular because of the small size and light weight. Pocket knives are sought after for their practical use and versatility.



LOCKBACK KNIFE

Lockback knives have the best of both worlds; the durability of a fixed blade combined with the convenience of a folding knife.

A lockback blade locks into place when open and requires a manual release to fold back into the handle.



LINER LOCKER

A liner lock acts like a lockback knife you can open with one hand. A thumb stud or hole opens the blade and locks it into place.
